Thinking about the November general election in 2016 for President,

The president is elected by a process called the Electoral College, which is established in the U.S. Constitution and was a compromise between a nationwide popular vote, and having members of Congress choose the President. The number of presidential electors in any state is equal to the number of congressional districts a state has plus its two United States Senate seats. The U.S. Constitution leaves it to the states to determine how its own electors are chosen and how they are divided.

Michigan currently has a winner-take-all system, just as 47 other states do and the District of Columbia. Nebraska and Maine are the only two states that divide their electoral votes. This means that the winner of the statewide popular vote receives all 16 of the state's electoral votes. A bill under consideration in the Michigan legislature would change Michigan from a winner-take-all system and instead, award 9 of its 16 electoral votes to the winner of the popular vote in the presidential election, with the winner able to receive additional electoral votes based on how much they beat the second-place finisher by in one-on-one vote totals. Each 1.5 points above 50 percent would mean another electoral vote with any remaining electoral votes going to the runner up. Under this system a presidential candidate can only win all of Michigan's 16 electoral votes if he or she is able to capture 60.5 percent of the statewide popular vote.

## [ROTATE STATEMENTS]

Supporters of the proposal to change Michigan's winner-take-all system say that by changing to a system where even if a candidate knows they won't win the popular vote, they can still win at least some of the state's electoral votes, will keep Michigan in the spotlight and attract candidates from both major political parties to continue campaigning in Michigan to compete for electoral votes. This means that more campaign money will be spent locally on advertising and other campaign activities. Supporters also say it's a fairer system because voters who support the candidate who loses the statewide popular vote will still have an effect which candidate is ultimately chosen as president.

Opponents say that efforts to change the winner-take-all system are being pushed by Republican Party interests and are only taking place in states like Michigan, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin and other winner-take-all states where Democratic presidential candidates usually win, but where the Governor's office and state legislatures are controlled by Republicans. The same push for this change <u>is not</u> taking place in winner-take-all states like Texas, Georgia and other states where Republicans control state government but Republican presidential candidates usually win. Opponents say the push to change the electoral college is nothing more than a scheme hatched by Republicans to siphon off 20, 30, 40 or more electoral votes for Republican candidates to increase their chance of winning the presidential election.
