Governor Snyder has made several proposals to raise state funding to repair and improve the roads. He would replace the existing 19 cent per gallon state tax on unleaded fuel and 15 cents per gallon tax on diesel fuel with a single 33 cent per gallon tax on both to raise an additional \$728 million. The gas tax could increase in future years based on changes in construction costs and fuel consumption, with increases capped at 5 percent per year. Vehicle registration fees would be increased by 25 percent on large trucks and trailers, and 60 percent for cars and light trucks to raise \$508 million. Today's \$123 vehicle registration fee on a \$25,000 car would increase by about \$80 per year. His proposal would also include a local option to apply a 0.18 percent tax on the price of vehicles to raise \$280 million more for local roads. #### "Skunk works" technology based education proposal

It was recently reported in the media that an education advisory workgroup labeled "Skunk Works," led by senior advisors to Governor Snyder, has been holding private, unpublicized meetings since last December. This "Skunk Works" group included both state employees and executives from private corporations involved with selling Internet-related products and services. The group has been developing plans for an education system that would replace teachers with a technology based learning system, designed to save state tax dollars. Under the proposal, the goal would be to operate a "value school" for \$5,000 per student instead of the average of more than \$7,000 per student currently paid to local public schools to teach children, and have the per pupil funding follow the student, who would pay for their education choices by using a debit-card type of system.
