- 58% Very certain to vote
- 3% Somewhat certain to vote
- 1% Will likely vote
- 38% Already voted by absentee ballot
- Chances 50-50/Not likely
- Undecided/Refused

- 40% Very certain to vote at the polls
- 2% Somewhat certain to vote at the polls
- 42% TOTAL VOTE POLLS**
- 57% TOTAL VOTE ABSENTEE**
- 2% Somewhat certain to vote absentee
- 55% Very certain to vote absentee (**COMBINED WITH Q.2** “Already voted by absentee”)
- 1% Undecided/Refused

__04. Overall, would you say that things in the country are generally headed in the right direction, or, have things pretty seriously gotten off on the wrong track?

- 28% Right direction
- 59% Wrong track
- 13% Undecided/Refused

__06. If the election for U.S. Senate were held today, would you, or did you already vote for **[ROTATE]** John James the Republican, Gary Peters the Democrat, or one or the third party candidates?

[IF UNDECIDED, ASK: “Well, if the election was being held today, and you had to decide right now, which candidate would you lean toward?” AND CODE BEST RESPONSE]

35% John James the Republican
 4% Lean toward James the Republican
39% TOTAL VOTE JAMES
 44% Gary Peters the Democrat
 1% Lean toward Peters the Democrat
45% TOTAL VOTE PETERS
 4% Third party candidate
 1% Lean toward third party candidate
5% TOTAL VOTE THIRD PARTY
 11% Undecided/Refused

__21. Do you think of yourself as pro-choice, meaning that you support allowing women to have the right to an abortion, or do you consider yourself pro-life, meaning that you oppose abortions, except when it is necessary to save the life of the mother?
